Candomblé meaning dance in honor of the gods is a religion that combines elements from African cultures including the Yoruba Bantu and Fon as well as some elements of Catholicism and indigenous South American beliefs Developed in Brazil by enslaved Africans it is based on oral tradition and includes a wide range of rituals including ceremonies dance animal sacrifice and personal.

Little contemporary written material has survived about religious traditions in ancient Africa except in inscriptions by ancient Egyptians about their beliefs and in accounts by Herodotus when he described the religions and folklore of North Africa The Egyptian beliefs involved gods and the monarchs as descendants of these deities and their representatives on earth.
